REFLECTING ON MY CAREER IN MOHS —

anderbilt Dermatology has changed a great deal since my residency in the mid-1990s. There were a total of eight residents during my tenure, and we carried three pagers on call. Those of you reading this who trained at that time will remember the brown recluse spider pager with either nostalgic fondness or dread. I officially joined the Department in 1998 when Dermatology was a Division of the Department of Medicine. We were a much smaller group of nine full-time faculty and two part-time faculty led by the consummate physician-scientist Dr.

Lloyd E King Jr. His sayings resonated in the exam room and in life. For example, "busy hands are happy hands" is applicable to your pruritic patient and to your bored four year old child. I still miss his smile in the hallway and am forever grateful for his support.

I joined Dr. Thomas Stasko as the second Mohs surgeon on the faculty. We worked out of four rooms and used a paper planner to lay out the week's surgeries long before the words Epic, templates, and smartphrases were a part of our vocabulary. Dr. Stasko's mentorship was invaluable in shaping my career. He was not only the type of surgeon but also the type of person that I wanted to emulate. I thank him for both his training in the operating room and his encouragement to pursue leadership opportunities in dermatology. He encouraged me to become the American College of Mohs Surgery delegate to the American Medical Association. This brought me great fulfillment as the delegation worked to impact organized medicine, and it also provided me with incredible friendships with colleagues across the country. During my time working with the American Medical Association, the Dermatology delegation addressed issues affecting patients and physicians including implementation of the Affordable Care Act, lessening the burden of prior authorizations, protecting the physicianpatient relationship, and many others.



My participation in the AMA delegation opened the door for my advocacy work within the American Academy of Dermatology as chair of the Grassroots Advocacy Task Force. One of my major roles in this position was spearheading the Legislative Conference in Washington D.C., where dermatologists interact with Congressional members and advocate on behalf of their peers and their patients. Looking out over a room of three hundred dermatologists who gave up two working days to advocate for policy changes that allow better patient care is a highlight of my career.

It is also ironic as I am the daughter of two politicians and insisted that I would be in an apolitical career. Never say never is a lesson I have learned. If you do, you may miss out on wonderful opportunities.

In 2002, Dr. George Stricklin became the new Chair of Dermatology, and I received the same unwavering support of my career from him. He always demonstrated a calm demeanor and a thoughtful approach to problems. I have tried to incorporate this style in my administrative roles. I hope I have been half as efficacious as he was. During this time, I often hosted the end of year resident party where he presided over the festivities. As the residency grew, so did the gatherings. By the time of his retirement in 2018, there were twelve residents and nineteen full-time faculty members.

As I transitioned to more administrative duties with the departure of Dr. Stasko in 2013, I was able to work with amazingly talented surgeons. Dr. Anna Clayton will always be the fellowship director that trains you well, feeds you well, and makes you feel like one of her own. Dr. Allison Hanlon can do multiple jobs at once, keeping up with each one and doing them all to perfection. Dr. William Stebbins has an incredible ability to teach and technical finesse that is unparalleled. Dr. Will Lumbang showed dedication to the transplant population and handled difficult cases

daily. The opportunity to work with them and learn from them was a gift. In 2018, Dermatology became its own Department under the leadership of Dr. Meg Chren. I have served as the Board Chair for both the Nashville Academy of Medicine and the Tennessee Medical Association. I am most proud of the Nashville Academy of Medicine's Project Access program which provides coordinated specialty care for uninsured patients. It remains one of the most fulfilling aspects of my career.

I spent twenty-eight years at Vanderbilt Dermatology, and I am thankful for every one of them.

THERE HAVE BEEN SOME SIGNIFICANT CHANGES TO OUR FELLOWSHIP IN THE LAST YEAR. After leading us as Chief of Procedural Dermatology since January 2013, Dr. Michel McDonald has retired. We miss her wisdom, grace, diplomacy, and superior surgical skills. We wish her all the best and are overjoyed that she is able to spend quality time with her lovely family.

Dr. Allison Hanlon and I have kept the home fires burning and have done our best to carry on without her. This October, we were very happy to welcome Dr. Stacy McMurray as our new Mohs surgeon colleague. She is a Tennessee native and no stranger to Vanderbilt as she completed her fellowship with us in 2020. She has spent the last three years as a member of the Mohs staff at the University of Pennsylvania. We are very lucky that she chose to join us in Tennessee. Welcome back, Dr. McMurray!

In the last five years, the Mohs team has been very active in clinical research, having completed an IRB approved study (started by Dr. McMurray when she was a fellow!) spanning several years and culminating in publication of results in peer reviewed journals. Thanks to the efforts of our fellows and residents, another original Vanderbilt IRB approved longitudinal clinical study is currently underway. Dr. Hanlon continues her very active participation on committees in the Mohs college and ASDS. Her involvement in these organizations keeps Vanderbilt Mohs at the forefront of education. We are also very excited that Dr. McMurray will now be representing us in the greater surgical community. She has presented at multiple national and international conferences, and we look forward to her future endeavors.



Dr. Ward received Distinguished Senior Investigator Award from the National Psoriasis Foundation



We are proud that 2023 has marked the launch of the North American Therapeutics in Epidermal Necrolysis Syndrome (NATIENS) double-blinded, multicenter, randomized placebo-controlled trial of etanercept and cyclosporine in SJS/TEN. n May 2023, DR. INGA SAKNITE travelled to the remote village of Kole in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). Kole is one of two locations of the PALM007 randomized placebo-controlled clinical trial that was launched in October 2022 to test the efficacy of tecovirimat against mpox. The Vanderbilt team has been supporting the PALM007 study by providing advice and training on mpox lesion counting and total body photography of study participants to document lesion appearance and disease course. The Vanderbilt team, led by Dr. Eric R. Tkaczyk, includes Dr. Benoit Dawant, Dr. Inga Saknite, Dr. Andrew J. McNeil, Bohan Jiang, and Tyra Silaphet. The PALM007 study is supported by the Institut National de la Recherche Biomédicale in the DRC and the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.



In terms of resident recruitment, our dermatology residency program continues to be competitive.


